CALIFORNIA GENERAL ELECTION OFFICIAL VOTER INFORMATION GUIDE

You can find detailed information about the state propositions on your ballot in the California General Election Official Voter Information Guide, which will be mailed to you by the California Secretary of State's Office. If you or someone you know does not receive the guide from the Secretary of State, you may view the information at www.voterguide.sos.ca.gov or you may pick up a copy of the guide at your local library or my office.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE VOTING SYSTEM

The voting system for Alpine County was implemented at the June 2006 Primary Election as a requirement of the federal Help America Vote Act (HAVA), enacted to improve the administration of elections in the United States, and California's Proposition 41, the Voting Modernization Act (Prop. 41). The voting system meets all the HAVA requirements, including the requirement to have a voting system that is accessible for any disabled voters. The County contracted with Premier Election Solutions for the AccuVote OS, optical scan voting system for mail-ballot voting, and for the AccuVote TSX direct recording electronic voting system for accessibility for disabled voters.

THE OPTICAL SCAN BALLOT AND VOTING SYSTEM:

The system for mail ballots is the paper-based AccuVote OS voting system that uses an optical scan ballot. Your optical scan ballot is enclosed in this envelope. You will find a Voter Instruction Guide for the optical scan ballot in the Sample Ballot Pamphlet. The guide will give you complete instructions for voting the optical scan ballot. With the optical scan ballot, all races are on one ballot – look at both sides for all candidates and measures – to vote you will fill in the oval to the left of the candidate or measure of your choice. Please use a dark colored pen or pencil. (Preferably black or blue, but please do not use red.)

After marking your ballot choices, you will return your ballot in the identification envelope, exactly as you have in the past.

THE DIRECT RECORDING ELECTRONIC (DRE) VOTING SYSTEM:

Under the Help America Voting Act, the accessibility requirements for accessible voting may be satisfied through the use of at least one direct recording electronic (DRE) voting system at each polling place. Because we vote by mail, and don't have polling places, a DRE will be available at the County Clerk's office for any voter. The DRE equipment can provide multi-lingual ballots, if required, provides an audio ballot for visually impaired voters, permits wheel-chair accessibility for persons with mobility impairment, prohibits over-voting in a contest, and warns if the voter has not cast a vote in every race. Our AccuVote TSX unit is a non-networked system that enables voters to cast a secure electronic ballot. The DRE unit that we use has a voter verified paper audit trail to provide a paper record of all ballots cast.

RETURNING YOUR VOTED MAIL BALLOT:

After voting, and completing the return identification envelope, you may return your vote by mail ballot by mail or by delivering to the County Clerk's Office. ***Reminder: if you return your ballot by mail, please mail early! I RECOMMEND YOU MAIL YOUR BALLOT NO LATER THAN FRIDAY, MAY 27, 2016.***

You may return your ballot in person to the County Clerk's Office, 99 Water Street, County Administration Building, Markleeville, California anytime between now and 8:00 p.m. on Election Day. Beginning January 1, 2016 postmarks count if your ballot is received within three days of the election (EC4103). An unsigned ballot may be counted if the voter signs an "Unsigned Ballot Statement" before 5pm on the eighth day after the election; the ballot must be received by election day or postmarked by election day (EC3019).

COUNTING BALLOTS:

Ballot tabulation is open to the public. Ballot tabulation/counting will commence at 8:00 p.m. in Board Chambers, Alpine County Government Center at 99 Water Street, Markleeville. Please feel free to come and observe the ballot tabulation process. We announce vote totals as precincts are counted and prepare a semi-official accounting at the end of the tabulation process. Voting results will be posted on the Alpine County website. We will have coffee and cookies available during the process.

Alpine County voters have proven in every election that they care about voting and believe in the democratic process – we are always in the top five counties in California for highest voter turnout, and have had the highest turnout in the state several times. Please help keep this tradition alive. Be sure to vote on Election Day!



1 Start: Read All Directions




Read all directions on your ballot carefully.

If the ballot allows you to cast **ONE** vote for a candidate or issue, fill in only one oval.

If the ballot allows you to cast **MULTIPLE** votes for a particular race, you may fill in the maximum number of ovals allowed by the directions.


2 Fill In Ballot Correctly




When you go through your ballot, use a dark colored pen or pencil (do not use red colors) to **COMPLETELY** fill in the oval to the left of the candidate or issue of your choice. Make sure you completely fill in the oval as illustrated (above left).

3 How to Write-In a Candidate




If there are write in candidates that you wish to vote for, find the blank line provided for "Write-In."

Clearly write the name of the eligible write-in candidate on the blank line.

Fill in the oval to the left of the blank line.


4 Review Your Ballot




If you have questions call the Elections Official at 530-694-2281 for assistance. If you make a mistake, tear, lose, or destroy any portion of your ballot, you may contact the County Clerk's office about a replacement.

When you have completed voting, remove the stub end from your ballot and place your ballot in the yellow Official Ballot Identification/Return Envelope.

Carefully read and complete the return envelope instructions. Complete and sign the Declaration on the back of the identification/return envelope. You must sign, fill in your residence address, the date and place of signing. **Your vote cannot be counted if you fail to complete and sign the I.D. envelope.**

Return your voted ballot by mail or by personally delivering it to the County Clerk's office.

(You may return the voted ballot by certified or registered mail. – Election Code 4102)

VOTER BILL OF RIGHTS

YOU HAVE THE FOLLOWING RIGHTS:

- 1** **The right to vote if you are a registered voter.** You are eligible to vote if you are:
 - a U.S. citizen living in California
 - at least 18 years old
 - registered where you currently live
 - not in prison or on parole for a felony
- 2** **The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list.** You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.
- 3** **The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.**
- 4** **The right to cast a secret ballot** without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.
- 5** **The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake,** if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:
 - Ask an elections official at a polling place** for a new ballot; or
 - Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot** for a new one at an elections office, or at your polling place; or
 - Vote using a provisional ballot,** if you do not have your original vote-by-mail ballot.
- 6** **The right to get help casting your ballot** from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.
- 7** **The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place** in the county where you are registered to vote.
- 8** **The right to get election materials in a language other than English** if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.
- 9** **The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures** and watch the election process. If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.
- 10** **The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity** to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.

NOTICE OF ALL-MAIL BALLOT ELECTION

NOTICE is hereby given that pursuant to California Elections Code section 3005, Precinct 1, Precinct 2, Precinct 3, Precinct 4 and Precinct 5, having less than 250 persons registered to vote within the precinct boundaries, are hereby declared mailed-ballot precincts for the June 7, 2016 Presidential Primary Election.

It is hereby declared that the election in Precinct 1, Precinct 2, Precinct 3, Precinct 4 and Precinct 5 will be conducted by all-mail ballot election procedures: there will be no polling place. Voters will automatically receive a vote by mail ballot by mail.

State election law provides that precincts with fewer than 250 voters may be sent vote by mail ballots instead of setting up a polling place (Elections Code §3005). The Board of Supervisors has agreed, in the spirit of treating all such precincts fairly, that all precincts with fewer than 250 voters will be vote by mail ballot precincts. For this election all five voting precincts will be vote by mail-ballot precincts and each voter residing in the county will receive a vote by mail ballot without the necessity of requesting one in writing.

NOTICE OF MAILED-BALLOT VOTING PROCEDURES

VOTED VOTE BY MAIL BALLOTS must be returned on or before 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, June 7, 2016, as follows:

- 1. BY MAIL.** Return postage is included. Mail the return envelope early enough for the post office to deliver it by Tuesday, June 7, 2016. **POSTMARKS COUNT but must be received within 3 days of the Election. I RECOMMEND YOU MAIL YOUR BALLOT NO LATER THAN FRIDAY, MAY 27th.**
- 2. BY PERSONALLY DELIVERING TO THE COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE.** Located in the Alpine County Government Center (99 Water Street) in Markleeville. Deliver by no later than 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday, June 7, 2016.

If you make a mistake, tear, lose, or destroy any portion of your ballot, you may contact the County Clerk's Office about a replacement. Call: 530-694-2281.

An vote by mail voter who, because of illness or other physical disability, is unable to return the voted ballot, may designate a spouse, child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, brother, sister or a person residing in the voter's household to return the ballot. If this is the case, the voter must print the name of the person, who is authorized to return the ballot, in the specified area on the back of the return envelope. The voter must also complete all portions of the envelope. PLEASE NOTE: Third parties, unless specified above, are not permitted to collect, mail or deliver voted ballots.

Prop. 34 – Expenditure Limitations: State Legislative Candidates

Proposition 34 was passed by voters in November 2000. The law requires county election officials to provide the names of those State Legislative candidates who have voluntarily agreed to expenditure limits. Candidates who agree to the expenditure limits may submit and pay for a Candidate's Statement of Qualifications to be printed in this pamphlet.

★★ “Top 2” Primary in California ★★

What is a Top 2 Primary?

A Top 2 Primary lets you cast one vote for *any* candidate (for most races), even if you are not in the same political party. The top 2 candidates – the ones who get the most votes in the primary – will be on the General Election ballot in November.

Is Top 2 different from the last primary election?

No. It became law in 2010 when we passed Prop 14. The June 2012 election was held under the Top 2 law. Before Top 2, each party could have one candidate on the General Election ballot for all party races.

Now with Top 2, only two candidates get on the General Election ballot for most races – the ones who got the most votes in the primary – no matter what party they are from.

What does *party preference* mean?

Party preference refers to the political party you – or the candidate – is registered with. It’s listed under each candidate’s name on the ballot. The word “None” appears for candidates who are *not* registered with a party. For example:

JOHN SMITH

Party Preference: Democratic

JANE DOE

Party Preference: Republican

CHRIS JONES

Party Preference: None

Do all offices on the June ballot follow the Top 2 rules?

No. Top 2 applies to these voter-nominated offices:

- ★ Congress Member
- ★ Statewide offices (such as Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, etc.)
- ★ State Assembly Member
- ★ Board of Equalization

Can the Top 2 candidates be from the same party?

Yes. The Top 2 candidates might be from the same party, different parties, or no party.

If only 1 or 2 candidates run for an office, will they still run in the primaries?

Yes.

What ballot will I receive in June?

All voters registered with a political party or not, will get the same ballot that will have:

- ★ All candidates from all parties for voter-nominated and nonpartisan offices, and
- ★ Any state and local measures.

No-Party Preference voters

Crossover Voting

What is Crossover Voting?

Presidential Primaries are especially unique because political parties have the ability to decide whether voters registered as No-Party Preference can "crossover" into their party, and vote for one of their candidates.

For the June 7, 2016 Presidential Primary Election, the **American Independent***, **Democratic** and **Libertarian** parties have allowed "crossover" voting. Vote-By-Mail voters who are registered as No-Party Preference and want to vote for one of those three respective parties can do so, but will first need to fill out a "crossover" ballot request. Please note that if you choose to request a "crossover" ballot, it **will not** change your registered party preference.

Voters who are registered as **No-Party Preference** and would like to vote in the June 7th Presidential Primary for a **Republican, Green, or Peace & Freedom** Presidential candidate, must re-register to vote for one of those respective parties by **May 23, 2016**.

**American Independent is a political party. It is not the same as being registered with No-Party Preference.*

What To Do Next:

1) What if you do not wish to request a "crossover" ballot?

- No action is required, a "Nonpartisan" ballot will be mailed to you automatically.

2) How do you check if you are registered as No-Party Preference?

3) Want to re-register to vote?

4) How can you apply for a Vote By Mail Crossover Ballot?
